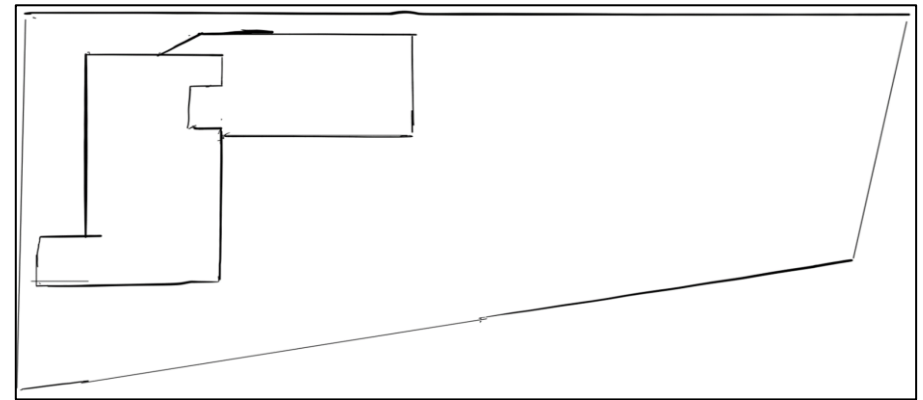


What geographical features can we see in and around our school?



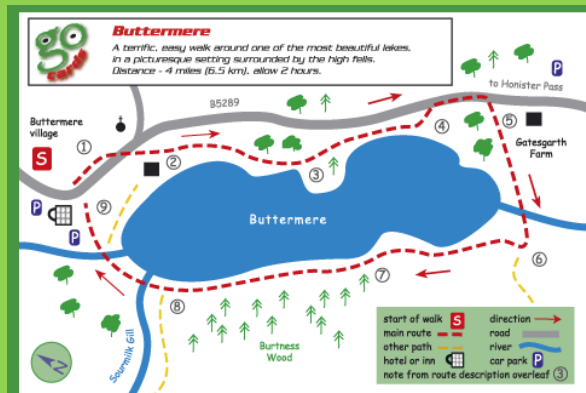
An aerial Photograph is a photograph taken from above looking down.

	observe	To watch/look at something carefully.	
	environment	The physical surrounding of a living thing. Everything around us.

	village	A small town or community, often in the country.	
	town	An area with streets, houses and buildings that is larger than a village.	
	neighbourhood	A small area or district in a city or town.	
	school grounds	The outdoor spaces around a school.	
	man-made	Made by humans.	
	natural	Not made by humans. Produced by nature.	
	local area	The area around where you live.	
	address	The place where someone lives or a business is found.	
	postcode	A code made up of letters and numerals used to identify a postal address.	
	map	A drawing of an area.	
	aerial view	What somewhere look like from above, looking down. (bird's eye view)	
	route	How to get to somewhere.	
	distance	How far away something is.	
	physical features	Things that you can see all around you. Physical features like seas, mountains and rivers are natural.	
	human features	Human features like houses, roads and bridges are things that have been built by people. They are man-made.	
	symbols	On a map, symbols show what different things can be found in an area.
